


We are delighted to have launched the BKRG coffee club for our regular service users who have been shielding during lockdown. We wanted to help them feel confident and comfortable

So what's been happening...

Hi folks

For those of you who don't already know me, I am Lesley Speedie, and I am the Chairperson of the Blackwood and Kirkmuirhill Resilience Group. In the last few newsletters both Katrina and Vicky touched on the upcoming plans for the group and what we were doing to support the community during the COVID-19 lockdown.



Since the 1st of August, when the shielding period was officially paused, the team have been focusing on building people's confidence and supporting people back into the community again. If you follow us on facebook you may have read about the different outreach activities for individuals who were shielding - our high tea & afternoon tea events went down a treat and our boxes of kindness and various activity packs kept folks busy with a mix of items from puzzles to sow-and-grow window ledge kits.

A social progression from these activities is our shielding people's coffee club. A socially distant coffee morning where people who have been using the BKRG services over lockdown can come along and enjoy a friendly chat with others who have also been isolating since late March. In addition to this, we have also invited other community group leads along to explain when other groups are starting back and what they can expect when the groups do start back.

However, COVID-19 still remains a threat and the biggest challenge for the group now is finding the balance and adapting our response effort to cater for people who may have to isolate due to the track-and-trace system, or people who may have to quarantine after returning from a restricted country or regional lockdown area. Many of our volunteers are now back working full time and can no longer support the group during normal working hours. We have therefore decided to keep the phone lines open between 10am and 12 noon and requests that require shopping will be carried out in the evening between 6pm and 8pm. So, if you are isolating or in quarantine, you can still call the resilience group between 10 and 12noon and the team will aim to have your shopping request completed that evening. If we do go back into a full lockdown the team will revert to our core response times as per the initial lockdown phase.

If the above was not keeping us busy enough, one of the keys focuses of the group will be the transitioning from a constituted community group to a not for profit community organisation. The constituted group model was a fast and effective means to set up our community response rapidly, and much to our amazement the group has grown considerably over the lockdown period.

Over the next month or so the team will be looking at how best to position the group for the long-term. Whilst COVID-19 response will always be our priority we hope to work with other community groups to help address long terms concerns for our community.

Holiday Club went virtual this year!

Whenever I speak to people in the community who have lived here their whole lives Holiday Club is something that many remember with great fondness. They remember the themes, the stories, the songs or the friendships made through Holiday Club and the fun that they had down at the church, every day for a week together. Holiday Club at Kirkmuirhill Parish Church started in 1976 and has become an annual event in the community. Last year, in my first year as Minister, we had almost 100 young people joining us each morning as we

explored different Heroes of the Bible. This year? Well, things have looked a little bit different this year!

On Monday 27th July the first episode of Holiday Club 2020 went live on the Church YouTube channel. It featured many familiar faces who the young people would



normally see up front each day. We introduced our Memory verse for the week, we had our Superhero warmups and every day featured a story about a Bible Superhero. Two of our favourite characters, Battered and Captain Sparkles, made appearances and brought with them their usual brand of nonsense. We had our craft instruction and we even had songs for the young people to sing along to. Every day that week was a little bit different, but we tried to include everything that our young people would normally experience at Holiday Club, hence the puppets!

The Holiday Club planning committee made the decision, a number of months ago, that our usual extravaganza would not be possible due to the current situation we are facing. At that point we had to choose between doing nothing or moving everything online. We decided on the latter and with 50 young people registered for our Virtual Holiday club it is clear we made the correct decision!

So, who is behind BKRG?






Hello,

Hello everyone,

I cannot believe that it's been over 4 months since BKRG was founded! I'm Jo and I've been found most days down at the hub as the emergency response lead and we have been blown away by the generosity and community spirit that we've encountered from yourselves. It's been clear that many of us have had the same



thoughts when lockdown was announced – with people unable to get to shops, supermarkets having empty shelves and many households seeing a sudden decrease in their incomes – food was going to be a large priority, both in terms of physically getting hold of it but the increased stress of worrying over it.

Thanks to the donations that came into the hub from both individuals and businesses in the community we were able to initially start supplementing shops where items were unable to

be found on the shelves before expanding into being able to offer care parcels for those who found themselves in tricky situations.

As well as food we have also been able to give out books and jigsaws to help pass the time as we were all spending more time at home. Second Chance gave us a huge donation of these items from the shop and again, individuals have shown the strength of the communities by donating these items too. I've turned into somewhat of a librarian at trying to figure out what books suit requests. It's been fascinating to watch as the outreach efforts have continued to grow and support the most vulnerable members.

I've been so proud to be part of these villages and involved in BKRG these past few months. Thank you to all of you for supporting us and each other in all the various forms that has taken.
